From the **Airport**, you may take the **S-Bahn S1 or S8**, and ride 10 stops until "**Laim**", then walk to Hotel Kriemhild (16 minutes by foot) or to Hotel Laimer Hof (10 minutes by foot).

From "Munich Central Station (München HBF)" you may take either tram 16 or 17. Get off at the stop "Kriemhildenstraße" for Hotel Kriemhild, or the stop "Romanplatz" for Hotel Laimer Hof. Marienplatz: Munich's heart and center! Deutsches Museum: The Deutsches Museum is one of the largest and most comprehensive museums of science and technology worldwide. Its vast collection spans disciplines from physics and astronomy to engineering, navigation, and the history of medicine. The exhibits are thoughtfully curated to highlight the historical development of scientific thought and technological innovation, offering a rich context for understanding how ideas have shaped—and been shaped by—society over time.
